

Global Prioritization Exercise (GPE) Regional and National Actors Consultations on Humanitarian Research and Innovation

OBJECTIVES

The main goal of the Global Prioritization Exercise (GPE) initiative was to enhance the global understanding of the humanitarian research and innovation priorities which in return will improve the ways in which the humanitarian sector uses evidence, responds to crises, and supports populations in need.

REGIONS OF WORK

This initiative was part of a broader GPE which seeks to improve outcomes for people affected by humanitarian crises in six geographic regions across the world named as the Western Asia and North Africa (WANA) region, Latin America and the Caribbean, Central and West Africa, Southern and East Africa, Oceania, Eastern and South-Eastern Asia, and Central Asia and South Asia).

BENEFICIARIES

The beneficiaries of this project included international agencies providing humanitarian research and innovation investments.

PROJECT PHASES

The project involved three phases:

<u>Phase I</u> – **Preparations:**

- Preparing for the regional consultation (Review key informant interview (KII) guides, obtaining institutional ethics approvals, Developing list of key informants for WANA)
- Prepare for Prioritization Exercise Training on methodology.

<u>Phase II</u> – **Implementation:**

- Conduct the regional consultation (KII)
- Conduct One training session to Consortium members and regional teams.

Phase III – **Closing:**

- Finalizing the regional report
- Launching the outcomes and priorities for WANA region.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The project was coordinated by a Consortium Central team from Deakin University and the American University of Beirut. The project comprised a series of regional and national consultations with a diverse range of stakeholders to examine humanitarian research and innovation priorities in six defined geographic regions. EMPHNET conducted the regional consultation for the WANA region and provided support to the consortium members and partners from all regions by acting as the lead advisor for the prioritization exercises.

A range of topics were identified by participants as requiring additional Research & Innovation attention in the region:

1. health-related issues

- 2. food and water security,
- 3. livelihoods,
- 4. education.
- 5. environmental issues and climate change.

Main Recommendations:

- 1. Developing a national humanitarian R&I strategies
- 2. Establishing national central coordinating bodies
- 3. Establishing R&I unit
- 4. Establishing regional humanitarian R&I platform
- 5. Building the capacity
